School Building Work Update:

It's so exciting to see the work progressing above ground this week with the erection of the steel frames. This means that we are also approaching the end of the noisiest and messiest stages of the build, as the structure of the extension begins to take shape.

During the half term holidays, some work on internal changes to the building will begin, including preparation for new toilet facilities at the end of the hall next to Class 2 and adaptations to the current staff room which will become our new library area!

School Meals Price Increase:

Unfortunately, our providers, Orian, have advised that, due to escalating costs, they will need to increase the cost of meals that they provide for school; I expect that this will not be a surprise to families as we see unprecedented price increases in our own shopping bills. This means that the cost will increase to £3.35 per pupil meal from 1^{st} April this year. Whilst this is unwelcome news, this is the first increase in two years and the meals do still offer excellent value for money and choice. Children who are eligible for free school meals and our infant children will not be affected.

Ofsted Inspection:

Thanks for all your support during out Ofsted Inspection last Tuesday, particularly to everyone who spoke to one of the inspection team and/or completed the parent survey. The inspection was a one-day ungraded inspection to determine whether the school remains a good provider. I am not able to share the outcomes of the inspection with you currently as this remains confidential until the report is published, but I anticipate that this will be soon after the half term break.

I would like to take a moment to congratulate our incredible pupils, many of whom had been quite significantly involved during the day. Children from across school were interviewed about maths and art lessons; asked about their views of what life is like at school; they shared their reading and interests in and out of school. They were also observed engaged in lessons; during social times on the playground; and their work across the curriculum was carefully scrutinised. They were all amazing ambassadors for our school and talked so enthusiastically to our visitors. The inspection also involved interviews with the staff; lesson observations; and discussions with governors, representatives from the local authority and Carlisle Diocese.

At half term we will be wishing Miss Butler all the best as she begins her maternity leave. We are all so excited for her and look forward to hearing the news of baby's arrival very soon. We promise to keep you updated.
