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1. Introduction

Our school is inclusive; we focus on the well-being and progress of every child and we are committed to ensuring all members of our community are equally valued.

Equality legislation exists to protect people but also to try and advance equality. Inequality still persists in the UK despite 40 years of equality legislation. In Cumbria we know that some groups do less well than others in terms of progress, achievement and later life chances. This picture is reflected nationally. The recognition of diversity and promotion of inclusive and equality practices will help to overcome this disparity.

Our school seeks to foster a warm, welcoming and respectful environment which allows us to question and challenge discrimination and inequality, resolve conflicts peacefully and work and learn free from harassment and violence.

We recognise that there are similarities and differences between individuals and groups but we will strive to ensure that our differences do not become barriers to participation, access and learning and to create inclusive processes and practices, where the varying needs of individuals and groups are identified and met. We therefore cannot achieve equality for all by treating everyone the same.

We believe that the Equality Act provides a framework to support our commitment to valuing diversity, tackling discrimination, promoting equality and fostering good relationships between people. It also ensures that we continue to tackle issues of disadvantage and underachievement.

We recognise that these duties reflect international human rights standards as expressed in the [UN Convention on the Rights of the Child](#), the [UN Convention on the Rights of People with Disabilities](#), and the [Human Rights Act 1998](#).

Our approach to equality is based on 7 key principles:

1. **All learners are of equal value.** Whether or not they are disabled, whatever their ethnicity, culture, national origin or national status, whatever their gender and gender identity, whatever their religious or non-religious affiliation or faith background and whatever their sexual orientation.
2. **We recognise, respect and value difference and understand that diversity is a strength.** We take account of differences and strive to remove barriers and disadvantages which people may face, in relation to age, sex, race, disability, religion or belief, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, sexual orientation or pregnancy and maternity (protected characteristics). We believe that diversity is a strength, which should be respected and celebrated by all those who learn, teach and visit here.
3. **We foster positive attitudes and relationships.** We actively promote positive attitudes and mutual respect between groups and communities different from each other. We are also committed to supporting our staff in the practical implementation of this Policy.
4. **We foster a shared sense of cohesion and belonging.** We want all members of our school community to feel a sense of belonging within the school and wider community and to feel that they are respected and able to participate fully in school life.
5. **We observe good equality practices for our staff.** We ensure that policies and procedures benefit all employees and potential employees in all aspects of their work, including in recruitment and promotion, and in continuing professional development.
6. **We have the highest expectations of all our children.** We expect that all pupils can make good progress and achieve to their highest potential.
7. **We work to raise standards for all pupils, but especially for the most vulnerable.** We believe that improving the quality of education for the most vulnerable groups of pupils raises standards across the whole school.

2. Purpose of the Policy

The Equality Act 2010 was introduced to ensure protection from discrimination, harassment and victimisation on the grounds of specific characteristics (referred to as protected characteristics). This means that schools cannot discriminate against pupils, staff or the wider school community or treat them less favourably because of their sex, race, disability, religion or belief, gender reassignment, sexual orientation or pregnancy and maternity.

Age and marriage and civil partnership are also “protected characteristics” and although are not part of the school provisions related to pupils, would apply to staff and the wider school community.

The Act requires all public organisations, including schools, to comply with the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) and two specific duties:

The Public Sector Equality Duty or “general duty”. This requires all public organisations, including schools, to:

- eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation;
- advance equality of opportunity between different groups;
- foster good relations between different groups.

Two “specific duties”. This requires all public organisations, including schools, to:

1. publish information (the Policy) to show compliance with the Equality Duty;
2. publish equality objectives at least every 4 years which are specific and measurable.

This Policy describes how our school, which has very limited resources, is meeting these statutory duties and working hard to ensure that equality is at the core of all that we do. This document is supported by our Equality Objectives Action Plan which demonstrates how we intend to ensure that principles of equality are embedded into our school and community life.

As a school we are able to collect the following information, broken down by race, religion or belief, sex, disability and, where relevant, sexual orientation, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, marriage and civil partnership, and age:

- Sanctions (including suspension and exclusion)
- Staff recruitment and selection
- Promotions
- Professional development opportunities

The Equality Act also applies to schools in their role as employers, and the ways in which we comply with this are found in our Recruitment and Selection procedures.

4. Our school profile

Levens CE School is a Church of England Voluntary Controlled School. The number of pupils on roll is currently 97 (including 12 who attend our nursery provision). Currently, there are 51 females to 46 males.

Data taken from the IDSR March 2026 for the year 2025:

School has a well below average number of pupils eligible for free school meals (FSM), at 7.95%, compared to the national average.

The number of pupils with special educational needs is below the national average at 8.82%. We have a number of vulnerable children in our school including those with a SEND and those previously looked after.

Standards of behaviour in school are extremely high, with no permanent or fixed term exclusions occurring in the current academic year 2025-26.

Every year, the vast majority of our Reception pupils transfer from our Nursery provision. In September 2025, 100% (all 8) of pupils entered School directly from our school nursery. When necessary, we work closely with children, families and pre-school settings where the children do not attend our nursery provision and build in regular opportunities for them to attend sessions in the summer term before starting school in September. This allows them to become accustomed to the school environment and develop relationships with staff prior to them beginning school full-time. Home visits are also undertaken by the EYFS staff team in the summer term prior to starting.

Our catchment area takes in the whole of Levens village and a large section of Heversham and surrounding villages, including Foulshaw. There are few amenities available locally including a village recreational area, a shop, post office etc. The immediate area is relatively prosperous and is a commuter area for professional families travelling to Kendal, Barrow and Lancaster.

A small number of our pupils come from outside our official catchment area.

We have an after-school club which operates to 5.15pm, Mon-Thurs. Over an average week, over 10% of the pupils use the after-school club each day.

More than 18% of our children come from single parent families. This has gradually increased over the last few years.

Staff recruitment and retention is positive with a high number of applicants for every position. Currently, we have no staffing vacancies. Recruitment procedures are based on those provided by our LA with all advertising being processed through the Council HR and Advertising Team.

The Local Authority (LA) processes admissions to the school. When we are made aware of pupils who are joining the school with special educational needs or disabilities, we arrange to meet the pupil and parents/carers and involve colleagues from the LA and Health Authority to ensure any adjustments or adaptations that are required in relation to our environment and resources are made in readiness for them starting school.

We also work closely with local partners to ensure we are able to ensure the pupil/s are able to thrive fully in our setting. The school has fully ramped access and is level throughout the building enabling access to wheelchair users. Our entrance is accessible to wheelchair users and we have one disabled toilet and show area.

Just over 2% of our pupils have English as an additional language.

Information for parents and others is provided in verbal and written form and we offer it in alternative formats on request.

Note: If we do not provide actual figures in relation to pupils or staff from ethnic minorities or any other equality group with protected characteristics it is because they are a small number of people and we must maintain their privacy. We are also not required to collect any statistical data which we do not already collect routinely e.g. RAISE online and other data.

5. What we are doing to eliminate discrimination, harassment and victimisation

- We take account of equality issues in relation to admissions and exclusions; the way we provide education for our pupils and the way we provide access for pupils to facilities and services.
- We are aware of the Reasonable Adjustment duty for disabled pupils – designed to enhance access and participation to the level of non-disabled pupils and stop disabled children being placed at a disadvantage compared to their non-disabled peers.
- The Head teacher ensures that all appointment panels give due regard to this Policy so that no one is discriminated against when it comes to employment, promotion or training opportunities.
- We actively promote equality and diversity through the curriculum and by creating an environment which champions respect for all.
- Our admissions arrangements are fair and transparent, and we do not discriminate against pupils by treating them less favourably on the grounds of their sex, race, disability, religion or belief, sexual orientation, gender reassignment, pregnancy or maternity.
- When considered to be relevant and necessary, we carry out Equality Impact Assessments (EIAs) on new policies, practices, events and decision-making processes to ensure that they are fair and do not disadvantage any protected group and promote quality of opportunity.
- We challenge all forms of prejudice and prejudice-based bullying.

Behaviour, exclusions and attendance

The school policies on behaviour and attendance take full account of our duties under the Equality Act. We make reasonable, appropriate and flexible adjustment for pupils with a disability. We closely monitor data on exclusions and absence from school for evidence of overrepresentation of different groups and take action promptly to address concerns.

Addressing prejudice and discriminatory-based bullying

The school challenges all forms of prejudice and discriminatory-based bullying, which stand in the way of fulfilling our commitment to inclusion and equality, including:

- prejudices around disability and special educational needs.
- prejudices around race, religion or beliefs.
- prejudices around gender and sexual orientation.

6. What we are doing to advance equality of opportunity between different pupil groups

- We know the needs of our school population very well and collect and analyse data in order to inform our planning and identify targets to achieve improvements. We take action to close any gaps, for example, for those making slow progress in acquiring age-appropriate literacy and number skills. We also ensure children from all groups are challenged to reach higher levels.

- We have procedures, working in partnership with parents and carers, to identify children who have a disability through our pupil admissions meetings and home visits.
- We collect, analyse and use data in relation to attendance and exclusions of different groups.
- We use a range of teaching strategies that ensures we meet the needs of all pupils.
- We are alert and proactive about the potentially damaging impact of negative language in matters such as race, gender, disability and sexuality.
- We ensure equality of access for all pupils to a broad and balanced curriculum, removing barriers to participation where necessary.
- Our school has an accessibility plan that is reviewed every 3 years or when a significant change has taken place. The Plan is published on the school website.
- We will take positive and proportionate action to address the disadvantage faced by particular groups of pupils with particular protected characteristics, such as targeted support. The actions will be designed to meet the school's Equality Objectives.

7. What we are doing to foster good relations

- We prepare our pupils for life in a diverse society and ensure that there are activities across the curriculum that promote the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of our pupils.
- We teach about difference and diversity and the impact of stereotyping, prejudice and discrimination through PSHE and citizenship and across the curriculum.
- We use materials and resources that reflect the diversity of the school, our local community and beyond in terms of race, gender identity, sexuality, disability and avoiding stereotyping.
- We promote a whole school ethos and values that challenge prejudice-based discriminatory language, attitudes and behaviour.
- We provide opportunities for pupils to appreciate their own culture and celebrate the diversity of other cultures.
- We include the contribution of different cultures to world history and that promote positive images of people.
- We provide opportunities for pupils to listen to a range of opinions and sympathise with different experiences.
- We promote positive messages about equality and diversity through displays, assemblies, visitors and whole school events.

In order to ensure that the work we are doing on equality meets the needs of the whole school community we:

- review relevant feedback from parent questionnaires, parents-teacher appointments etc.
- secure and analyse responses from staff surveys, staff meetings and training events.
- review feedback and responses from the children.
- ensure that we secure responses and feedback at Governing Body meetings.

8. Publishing equality information and objectives

We identify and publish equality objectives on a four-year cycle. The objectives are reviewed each year by the school's Governors and SLT and are available on our website. We are happy to provide our equality objectives in other formats if requested.

In line with DfE guidance on what we must or should publish on the school website, we consider collecting and publishing governing board members' diversity data so that such information is widely accessible to members of the school community and the public.

Objective 1: Raise pupil awareness of SEND, including neurodiversity.
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<i>Due to the changing needs of our pupils and their families; and a significant increase in the number of pupils demonstrating EBSA, neuro-diversity, SEND and trauma we want to develop our pupils' knowledge, understanding, tolerance and respect of a range of needs (both visible and invisible) so that all pupils become advocates for one another and individual pupils have a greater sense of belonging. This involves</i>

<i>exploring these topics in assemblies and SCARF, which will be extended through specifically themed weeks/days e.g. World Autism Day, Genes for Jeans Day, Learning Disability Week.</i>
Objective 2: Reduce barriers and increase attainment for our disadvantaged pupils.
<i>Within our school and across our local school cluster, the outcomes for our disadvantage pupils demonstrate a gap between them and the rest of their peers. Through targeted support and intervention, staff CPD, specific support clearly defined on our pupil premium strategy and collaboration with cluster schools, we intend to reduce that gap so that more pupils achieve ARE at the end of Year six and leave Levens secondary-ready.</i>
Objective 3: Promote inspirational figures from different backgrounds and cultures through the curriculum and assemblies.
<i>By exploring people from different cultures, traditions and backgrounds through assemblies and the curriculum, our pupils will develop knowledge and understanding of the world beyond our local community, to reflect life in modern Britain and beyond. This will endeavour to foster greater tolerance and respect. A specific series of assemblies entitled, 'Inspirational People', led by the wider staff team, will enhance other worship/assembly topics that also explore these themes throughout the school year.</i>
Objective 4: Ensure all governors and staff have undertaken relevant training on diversity, equality and inclusion in order to be able to reflect on and review our curriculum, our environment and opportunities for all our pupils and their families.
<i>Through revisiting high-quality CPD, Subject leaders will be able to evaluate how their curriculum subject areas promote positive representation and inclusivity and consider further opportunities to explore themes relating to protected characteristics. All governors will have a deeper understanding of their duty to comply with the Equality Act via training with the NGA. In turn, they will be able to specifically identify how subject leaders reflect and review curriculum subject areas in relation to diversity, equality and inclusion.</i>

9. Roles and responsibilities

We expect all members of the school community and visitors to support our commitment to promoting equality and meeting the requirements of the Equality Act. We will provide training, guidance and information to enable them to do this.

Governing Body

The Governing Body is responsible for ensuring that the school complies with legislation; that this Policy and its related procedures and action plans are implemented and form part of the School Improvement Plan (SIP); support is provided to the Head teacher in implementing any actions necessary. The Governing Body will receive and attend training in order to successfully discharge their duties under the legislation.

Every governing body committee keeps aspects of the school's commitment to the Equality Duty under review, for example, in terms of standards, curriculum, admissions, exclusions, personnel issues and the school environment. Equality objectives are set every four years by the Governing Body. The Governing Body assess the success in reaching the objectives annually.

Head teacher and Leadership team

The Head teacher is responsible for overseeing the implementation of the Policy; for ensuring that all staff are aware of their responsibilities and are given appropriate training and support; developing partnerships with external agencies regarding the Policy so that the school's actions are in line with the best advice available; ensuring Equality Impact Assessments are conducted on functions and Policies; and for taking appropriate action in any cases of unlawful discrimination.

The Head Teacher also has the day-to-day responsibility for co-coordinating implementation of the Policy and for monitoring outcomes.

Teaching and support staff

All teaching and support staff will:

- promote an inclusive and collaborative ethos in their classroom;
- challenge prejudice and discrimination;
- deal fairly and professionally with any prejudice-related incidents that may occur;
- plan and deliver a broad and balanced curriculum that reflects the school's principles, for example, in providing materials that give positive images in terms of race, gender and disability;
- maintain the highest expectations of success for all pupils;
- support different groups of pupils in their class through differentiated planning and teaching, especially those who may (sometimes temporarily) find aspects of academic learning difficult;
- keep up to date with equality legislation relevant to their work.

We will provide training and guidance on equality for all staff. Our guidance is reviewed annually and re-introduced to staff at the start of the year. It is also introduced to all new members of staff at induction.

Pupils

Pupils are expected, and will be supported, to:

- Be provided with support and understanding about how the policy relates to them in an age or ability appropriate way;
- act in accordance with any relevant part of the Policy;
- experience a curriculum and environment which is respectful of diversity and difference and prepares them well for life in a diverse society;
- understand the importance of reporting discriminatory bullying and racially motivated incidents;
- help us ensure our peer support programme promotes understanding and supports pupils who are experiencing discrimination.

Visitors

All visitors to the school, including parents and carers, are expected to support our commitment to equality and comply with the duties set out in this Policy. We will provide guidance and information to enable them to do this. Information will be placed on the school website and is on display in our school entrance.

Equal opportunities for staff

This section deals with aspects of equal opportunities relating to staff. We are committed to the implementation of equal opportunities principles and the monitoring and active promotion of equality in all aspects of staffing and employment.

- All staff appointments and promotions are made on the basis of merit and ability and in compliance with the law.
- We are also concerned to ensure, wherever possible, that the staffing of the school reflects the diversity of our community.
- As an employer we strive to ensure that we eliminate discrimination, sexual harassment, harassment and victimisation in our employment practice and actively promote equality across all groups within our workforce.
- We respect the religious beliefs and practice of all staff, pupils and parents, and comply with reasonable requests relating to religious observance and practice.
- We ensure that all staff, including support, administrative staff, and others employed on a regular basis by external organisations, receive appropriate training and, where applicable, opportunities for professional development, both as individuals and as groups or teams.

10. Monitoring and reviewing the Policy

We update and re-publish our Equality Policy as necessary, our school profile and objectives annually to account for the September intake or staffing changes and how they affect diversity in school, and the action

plan no less than every 4 years. We will also review our action plan in brief annually in light of any new objectives to ensure our longer-term goals remain relevant.

11. Disseminating the Policy

This Equality Policy, along with the Equality Objectives and related information, is available:

- on the school website.
- as paper copies in the school office.
- on display for visitors, including parents and carers.

We publish copies of relevant Policies and guidance, including those on behaviour, admissions and special educational needs, on our school website.

12. Complaints

Complaints arising from the operation of this Policy will be dealt with in line with the school's complaints procedure.

Complaints by staff will be dealt with under the Grievance Procedure, as appropriate.

We take all complaints seriously and will take appropriate action to eliminate discriminatory behaviour.

We will monitor complaints to help establish whether we are meeting our equality duties and report regularly to the Governing Body about the nature of complaints made and action taken.
